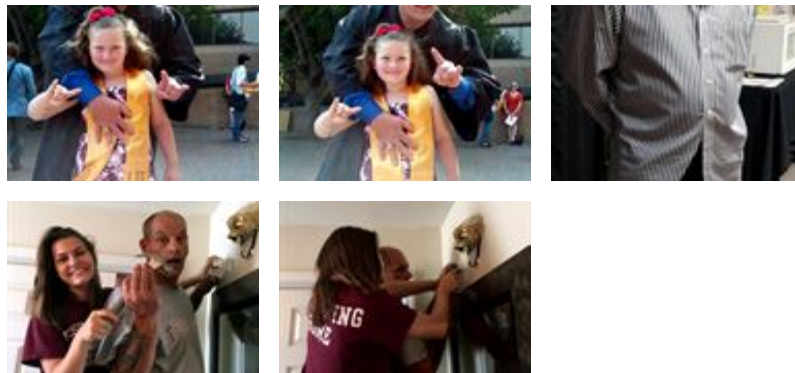

“ David was my supervisor at Austin Recovery when I was a student intern but we quickly became friends and colleagues. He had the ability to make me angry one minute and laugh hysterically the other. We shared the same wickedly, cooky, sense of humor. I always knew when he was in the hospital because he'd call and tell me, "Well, my hearts broken again" followed by some crass remark about what his nurses were doing or not doing to him.



He taught me all the things about being an addictions counselor that one does not learn from a book. My heart aches at the loss of my mentor and friend. He promised me we would grow old together helping one addict at a time, and that some day we would work together again (but I think mostly because he needed me to decorate his office with all his Longhorns memorabilia and degrees.) He inspired me to get my masters and it pains me to know he won't be here to rub his PhD in my face.

He had many regrets in his life but he didn't dwell on the past losses. He was driven and proud of his education but he was most proud of being a father and grandfather.
