I was somewhat worried about her as she told us she had never done this before and didn’t know anyone who was to be there (remember this is before everyone had cell phones). Our destination was a farm outside Macomb, Illinois (some 80 Miles). So, we headed out traveling mostly 2 lane roads and going through small farming towns. We stopped at a hardware store and grocery store to pick up provisions. When we arrived, I was astounded at the number of people there, literally thousands, they had large tents set up for revivals/services, entertainment, showering, medical, food (Pizza Hut, Kentucky Fried, and others. It was getting on toward dark, I found a suitable place for Debby to set up her tent as she had never done this before, so Sandi and I helped her get everything set up. We then, reluctantly had to leave her for our drive home of 70 Miles, but we would be back to get her in a few days when it ended. We took her back to the train station in Springfield and put her on a train headed back to San Antonio. We saw Debby on occasions when we were in Texas visiting friends and relatives, she always had that big grin upon greeting you. She will be missed in this life, but I am sure that my wife greeted her at those Pearly Gates.
